


# SHOULD LOW VISION STUDENTS **BE ELIGIBLE TO PURSUE MBBS**

In a recent Supreme Court ruling, a person with low vision has been allowed to pursue MBBS on the basis of his NEET score in the disability category



# RULING IN CONFORMITY WITH LAWS

Students with low vision or other



forms of impairment can pursue Medicine since there are no dearth of options. The SC's ruling is in conformity with both national and international laws since India has ratified the Rights of

the Person with Disability (PwD) under the UN convention. We need to have systems in place to accommodate persons with special needs. Had the Supreme Court put a blanket ban on the student from the MBBS course, it would have spoken of prejudice. When a person has low

vision, it does not necessarily mean s/he is suffering from it.

## **EVALUATION IS A MUST**

The protocol of medical

education starts with



history-taking followed by physical examination of the patient to make an accurate diagnosis. In such a situation, a doctor with visual impairment will have to fight the odds. It is

important to evaluate the level of visual impairment of a student to certify his eligibility for MBBS

course. Since the SC has given the verdict in the student's favour, he can pursue specialisations which does not require active visual inputs. In medical learning, time is of significant essence because the syllabus is so vast. And even in the emergency room where the patient is hanging between life and death, it is important to consider whether a doctor with low vision can address the crisis.

#### NEED MEDICAL SCHOOL FOR SUCH CANDIDATES
