pers in offline mode and try to pers in ormse mode and try to complete each of them within the stipulated time. After taking each mock test, you should do a proper analysis to figure out the topics you are lacking in and focus more on those areas. While deviaing a strategy to approach the paper, do keep in mind that all the five sections demand your equal attention.

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1. English: This section carries 40 questions on comprehension and grammar. Keeping in mind the trend of last two years' papers, focus on RC, idioms, synonyms, word meanings, etc.

2. Mathematics: This is the section most CLAT apprains are should of A come-chapter. It was

based entirely on elementary mathematics. For instance, in 2017, the questions asked were mostly from arithmetic, while in 2016, the section was more halanced, with questions from per-centage, ratio, TDS, algebra, number system, etc.

3. Logical Reasoning: This

on carries 40 questions. Looking at previous years trends, the emphasis has been on analytical reasoning, with very few questions on verbal reasoning. To ace this section, read every question and its options careful-

ly before attempting to answer.

4. General Knowledge: This section has been mostly domina-

ted by questions on current affairs. But that does not mean you can skip the static portions. Read static from any standard bo-ok; and revise current affairs of the past one year, with more emphasis on the second half of the year. Do cover news of natio-nal importance, international news, swards, sports, books and authors, etc.

5. Legal Aptitude: This section consists of questions on le-gal reasoning and knowledge. For the former, all you need to do to is to answer the queetions be-sed on the principle and facts gi-ven. In knowledge part, you sho-uld be adept at both static and

current knowledge.
